PROCLAMATION

RESOLUTION #18-261

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE 12TH ANNUAL TURN THE TOWNS TEAL® CAMPAIGN, A NATIONAL CAMPAIGN PROMOTING AWARENESS OF OVARIAN CANCER AND ITS SYMPTOMS

WHEREAS, ovarian cancer is the fifth leading cause of cancer-related death among women in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the month of September is dedicated to raising awareness of ovarian cancer; and

WHEREAS, ovarian cancer is called the "silent disease" because its symptoms are often vague or subtle; and

WHEREAS, if detected in its early stages, the survival rate from ovarian cancer is 90-95 percent, yet the relative five-year survival rate for ovarian cancer is 46 percent because it is so difficult to detect early. Survival rates vary greatly depending on the stage of diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, the Turn The Towns Teal[®], a national campaign to promote awareness of ovarian cancer and its symptoms, was the inspiration of Gail MacNeil of Chatham, New Jersey during her 10-year battle with ovarian cancer. This campaign continues to go forward in her name and in her honor; and

WHEREAS, Turn The Towns Teal[®] and the Ovarian Cancer Research Fund Alliance (OCRFA) are partnering to promote awareness of ovarian cancer through the Turn The Towns Teal[®] campaign; and

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Chatham that they hereby support the Turn The Towns Teal[®] campaign, a national campaign to promote awareness of ovarian cancer and its symptoms, and authorize the placement of teal colored ribbons around Borough trees during the month of September; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the placement of any banners or signage must be reviewed and approved in advance of their posting on Borough property by the Borough's Zoning Officer and that all ribbons shall be removed from Borough trees on or before September 30, 2018.

Council Member Fife made a motion to approve Resolution #18-261. Council Member Weber seconded the motion. A vote was taken and Resolution #18-261 was approved unanimously.

Council Member Fife presented the proclamation to Jane MacNeil, executive officer for the Turn The Towns Teal® campaign. Mrs. MacNeil was accompanied by Anna McCormick, a Borough resident and survivor of ovarian cancer. Mrs. MacNeil and Anna McCormick thanked Mayor Harris and the Borough Council for their support and bringing awareness of ovarian cancer and the importance of early screening.

APPOINTMENT

RESOLUTION #18-262

RESOLUTION APPOINTING COMMANDING OFFICER BRIAN K. GIBBONS TO THE RANK OF CHIEF OF POLICE IN THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM

WHEREAS, due to the retirement of former Chief of Police Philip Crosson, Jr., there exists a vacancy in the position of Chief of Police in the Borough of Chatham; and

WHEREAS, Commanding Officer Brian K. Gibbons, has expressed his interest in the Chief of Police position for the Borough of Chatham; and

WHEREAS, Commanding Officer Gibbons, is an experienced, dedicated and decorated law enforcement executive who first began his law enforcement service as a Police Patrol Officer in 1999 and, in September 2002, continued his law enforcement career with the Chatham Borough Police Department where he rose through the ranks to Patrol Sergeant, Administrative Sergeant, Lieutenant/Executive Officer, Captain/Executive Officer, and to Commanding Officer in March 2018; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Chatham Borough Police Promotion Policy, the Promotion Examination Board, consisting of the Borough Administrator and the Public Safety Committee, shall evaluate the candidates for promotion to the rank of Chief of Police; and

WHEREAS, the Promotion Examination Board has determined that Commanding Officer Gibbons is well-qualified to serve as the Chief of Police and recommends his appointment to the rank of Chief of Police in the Chatham Borough Police Department; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 48, §48-4 of the Code of the Borough of Chatham provides that the Mayor shall appoint a Chief of Police with the consent and approval of Borough Council; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Bruce A. Harris, in consideration of the recommendation made by the Promotion Examination Board does hereby appoint Commanding Officer Brian K. Gibbons to the rank of Chief of Police in the Chatham Borough Police Department, effective August 14, 2018.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of the Borough of Chatham that they hereby concur with the Mayor's appointment of Commanding Officer Brian K. Gibbons to the rank of Chief of Police and provide their consent; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Commanding Officer Gibbons is hereby promoted to the rank of Chief of Police at an annual salary of \$156,085.21, to be pro-rated for the remainder of 2018, and that the Mayor is authorized to sign the Employment Agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Borough Council congratulate and extend their best wishes to Police Chief Brian K. Gibbons.

Council Member Collander made a motion to approve Resolution #18-262. Council President Resto seconded the motion. A vote was taken and Resolution #18-262 was approved unanimously.

ADMINISTRATION OF THE OATH OF OFFICE

The Borough Clerk administered the oath of office to Police Chief Brian Gibbons, who was accompanied by his family.

Following the oath of office, Police Chief Gibbons was presented the Police Chief's badge by Mayor Harris. Mayor Harris and the Borough Council congratulated Chief Gibbons on his promotion and applauded him for his dedication in serving the needs of the community.

Police Chief Gibbon, who is the ninth Police Chief to be appointed in the Borough, thanked the Mayor and Council. He also thanked his fellow colleagues in the Police Department and Borough government, law enforcement officials from Morris County and surrounding towns, firefighters, first responders, and his family and friends for their support throughout his law enforcement career.

Council Member Fife made a motion to approve Resolution #18-264. Council President Resto seconded the motion. A vote was taken and Resolution #18-264 was approved unanimously.

RECUSALS

Mayor Harris asked if there are any recusals or abstentions to be submitted for the record with respect to any item listed on the agenda.

There were no recusals presented on the record.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

JCP&L Infrastructure Investment Program – Mr. Rob Walton, Jersey Central Power & Light Company (JCP&L) Area Manager for the Summit District, provided a brief update on JCP&L's Infrastructure Investment Plan. JCP&L filed a 4-year infrastructure plan in July 2018 with the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (BPU) to enhance the reliability and resiliency of its distribution system and to reduce the frequency and duration of power outages.

The plan includes about \$400 million in targeted investments, which includes an enhanced tree removal program that will have an emphasis on removing ash trees affected by the emerald ash borer near JCP&L power lines, flood mitigation measures at substations, as well as installing new technology that can pinpoint power outage locations and isolate damage on the distribution system for quicker service restoration. The plan would also accelerate the replacement of aging equipment. Mr. Walton mentioned that JCP&L's Infrastructure Investment Plan would initially increase a customer's service cost by approximately \$0.25 per month and up to approximately \$1.89 per month in year 4.

The Governing Body inquired whether JCP&L's investment plan includes burying utility wires underground and also inquired about the roll-out of smart meters.

Mr. Walton responded that cost estimates undertaken by the BPU report that burying utilities underground could cost as much as \$3 million per mile. BPU's Rate Counsel has been opposed to mandating the installation of smart meters because the cost of the smart meter, about \$500.00 per meter, would be borne by the consumer.

Mayor Harris thanked Mr. Walton for his presentation and mentioned that the BPU will be scheduling a public hearing sometime in the fall. He also informed Mr. Walton that the Governing Body would discuss whether to consider a resolution in support of JCP&L's Infrastructure Investment Plan.

Capital Projects Update – Mr. Vince DeNave, Borough Engineer, provided an update on the following 2018 capital projects:

- 1. The installation of the artificial turf field at Lum Field has been completed. A minor punch list of items will be addressed in the next week.
- 2. Belgium block curbing has been completed on the Weston Avenue Road Reconstruction project; however, due to the rainy weather, the concrete work is progressing slowly. Mr. DeNave will ensure that notice is provided to residents before the milling and paving of the roadway begins.
- 3. The 2018 Curb and Sidewalk program will begin at the end of August.
- 4. Morris County is finalizing the design specifications of the North Passaic Avenue Road Construction project. Mr. DeNave will coordinate street tree removals and new street tree planting with the Shade Tree Commission.
- 5. There have been no major complaints concerning wide-spread drainage issues, despite the heavier amount of rainfall this summer.
- 6. Mr. DeNave and the Department of Public Works continue to identify inflow and infiltration issues with the sanitary sewer lines. Twenty-two new manhole covers have been ordered to replace conventional manhole covers in locations that become submerged during heavy rainfall. Sections of sanitary sewer lines are also being identified for slip lining retrofits.
- 7. The Borough has filed a permit with the state's Division Fish and Wildlife for the acquisition and introduction of five carp into Kelley's Pond for the aquatic control of duckweed.
- 8. New quotations have been received for the repainting of the water tanks on Longwood Avenue. Mr. DeNave reported that a company will provide him with a presentation on the process used to encapsulate the lead paint. Although he estimates the cost to repaint the water tanks will be about \$40,000.00, the quotes received so far are coming in much higher.

9. PSE&G will schedule additional road micro surfacing work next year on streets that may need more work. Mayor Harris mentioned that a PSE&G infrastructure update is scheduled for October 22nd.

River Road Redevelopment – Mr. DeNave and Mr. Williams provided a presentation regarding the proposed redevelopment of three contiguous parcels on River Road. The proposed redevelopment would include the Crown Oil, Burling Industries and National Manufacturing Oil sites (Block 135, Lots 9, 10 and 11/12 respectively) and have a combined acreage of approximately 4.5 acres. Each lot would require some degree of environmental cleanup and remediation. Mr. DeNave mentioned that 16 River Road (Block 135, Lot 10) had recently been approved by the Planning Board for a 47-unit apartment building.

Mr. DeNave further reported that the Borough would need to address several infrastructure considerations as part of the redevelopment planning process. This would include sanitary sewer lines, water mains, the widening of River Road and intersection improvements at Watchung Avenue, and the installation of underground utilities. He said the redevelopment planning process should also include discussions for a potential new NJ Transit train station on the Gateway Redevelopment Area.

Mr. DeNave stated that the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law would allow the Borough to initiate a process by which properties that meet certain criteria can be designated an area in need of redevelopment to make redevelopment projects more feasible.

Council Member Weber mentioned that he agreed with the need to redevelop River Road but questioned why the Borough would be interested in redeveloping River Road at this time when the Borough is engaged in the redevelopment planning process of Post Office Plaza. He further inquired whether the party interested in redeveloping River Road is the same party that had received approval from the Planning Board to redevelop Lot 10 and, if so, why is the developer now asking the Borough to designate the area an Area in Need of Redevelopment.

Mayor Harris responded that because an opportunity and an interest has presented itself, the Borough should consider the redevelopment of River Road at this time. He further mentioned that there is some speculation that the market may not be there a year from now and that it is best to "strike while the iron is hot."

Mr. DeNave further responded that once an area is designated as an area in need of redevelopment, the Borough controls the redevelopment planning process, as well as infrastructure improvements, not the developer.

Council Member Weber further inquired why there has been no public discussion by the Governing Body as to what the developer proposes to build. He mentioned that the proposed redevelopment project is to build 340 dwelling units, which Borough officials and residents might not want. He further expressed his concern that the Borough would be spending about \$8,000.00 to retain Topology as the planner and another \$2,000.00 to \$5,000.00 in legal costs just to complete the preliminary investigation as part of the first stage of the redevelopment process.

Council Member Hoffman offered that the preliminary investigation report would provide a useful analysis of the area for Borough officials and would be a relatively small investment in a process that may result in more future ratables for the community. He mentioned that as the redevelopment process continues, costs would shift to the developer. He further mentioned that declaring an area in need of redevelopment would engage the Planning Board, the Governing Body and the residents in the redevelopment planning process as opposed to a developer solely going before the Zoning Board of Adjustment or Planning Board for approvals.

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

NOTICE OF PUBLIC COMMENT TIME LIMIT

Hearing of citizens during the Public Comment section of the Agenda is an opportunity for any member of the public to be heard about issues which are/are not topics scheduled for Public Hearing tonight. To help facilitate an orderly meeting, and to permit all to be heard, speakers are asked to limit their comments to a reasonable length of time.

Mayor Harris opened the meeting to the public.

Rozella Clyde, 33 Carmine Street, questioned the cost estimates to bury utility wires underground and encouraged the governing body to continue pursuing this issue, as well as "smart meters." Dr. Clyde also voiced her support for the redevelopment of River Road.

Mayor Harris informed everyone that the BPU will host a public hearing on JCP&L's Infrastructure Investment Plan and mentioned that once the hearing schedule is known, the Borough will inform residents. He encouraged residents to provide their comments to the BPU at the public hearing.

Lisa Hart, 24 Hedges Avenue, thanked the Mayor and Borough Council for recently passing a gun violence resolution and requested a resolution proclaiming October 7, 2018, as "Respect Life Day in Chatham Borough."

Council Member Hoffman thanked Ms. Hart for her comments and mentioned that it would be up to the consensus of the governing body to put forth such a resolution.

Seeing no one else wishing to comment, Mayor Harris closed the meeting to the public and proceeded with the Council Committee Reports.

REPORTS

COUNCIL COMMITTEES

Budget and Finance - Council Member Hoffman reported that the 2019 budget process has begun. Department heads have been provided with 2019 budget worksheets for both operating and capital budget requests.

Long Range Traffic & Pedestrian Safety Planning - Council Member Collander reported that the Police Department has completed a sixth traffic count along Main Street. Data shows that there has been some reduction in traffic volume. He mentioned Borough officials believe the reduction in traffic volume is due to the new message board on eastbound Route 24 that provides travel times to Columbia Turnpike and Route 287 to encourage drivers to remain on Route 24.

Council Member Collander reminded residents to use the pedestrian flashing lights when crossing Main Street at Railroad Plaza North and when crossing Fairmount Avenue at the train station. He further encouraged pedestrians to make eye contact with motorists before crossing the street.

Public Safety & Emergency Services - Council Member Collander had nothing new to report.

Personnel - Council President Resto reported that the Personnel Committee is working on the Department of Public Works collective bargaining contract.

Public Works Planning/Community Services - Council Member Fife had nothing new to report.

Shared Services & 3rd Party Agreements - Council Member Weber had nothing new to report.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Harris reported that the Post Office in Chatham will host an Open House on Wednesday, August 15th from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. He encouraged residents to tour the facility and mentioned that the Open House provides an opportunity for residents to address any concerns that they may have with their postal service. Mayor Harris also mentioned that a hearing has been scheduled on Thursday, August 16th with New Jersey Transit Corporation and state officials. He reported that Assemblywoman Nancy Munoz had sent a letter to the Executive Director of the New Jersey Transit Corporation concerning the daily cancellations and delays of NJ Transit's rail service. Assemblywoman Munoz' letter is posted on the Borough's website. Mayor Harris lastly reported that Resolution #18-273, listed on the Consent Agenda, extends the due date for third quarter property tax bills. He explained that tax bills were delayed due to the state making last-minute changes in state aid to local school districts and mentioned that the School District of the Chathams had received an additional \$350,000.00 in state aid, and chose not to apply the additional funds to reduce the tax rate.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Mr. Williams reported that the Morris County Division of Mosquito Control has been hand-spraying areas in town, as well as using truck-supported spraying. He encouraged residents to visit the Borough website to learn more about how to control mosquitos on their property. Mr. Williams reminded residents to register for AlertChathamBorough, which now uses the Smart911 platform. Lastly, he reported that the Chatham Historical Society's new bronze plaque commemorating Public School No. 1 has been mounted on Borough Hall.

RESOLUTION REQUIRING SEPARATE ACTION

Mr. Lott advised that a technical correction should be made to Resolution #18-265 to include the words "non-condemnation" in both the title and in paragraph 2.

Council President Resto made a motion to amend Resolution #18-265 to include the words "non-condemnation" in both the title and in paragraph 2 in the resolution. Council Member Collander seconded the motion. A vote was taken and the amendment to Resolution #18-265 was approved unanimously.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM, COUNTY OF MORRIS, NEW JERSEY, AUTHORIZING THE PLANNING BOARD OF THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM TO UNDERTAKE A PRELIMINARY INVESTIGATION TO DETERMINE IF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY WITHIN THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM ARE AREAS IN NEED OF REDEVELOPMENT (NON-CONDEMNATION)

WHEREAS, the Borough Council desires to direct the Planning Board to undertake a preliminary investigation to determine if all or a portion of certain real property within the Borough of Chatham, specifically, Block 135, Lots 9, 10, 11 & 12 on River Road, are areas in need of redevelopment pursuant to and in accordance with the local Redevelopment and Housing Law, *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-1, *et seq.*; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Borough of Chatham, County of Morris, and State of New Jersey, as follows:

1. The Planning Board is hereby authorized to undertake a preliminary investigation to determine if all or a portion of certain real property within the Borough of Chatham as set forth herein are areas in need of redevelopment pursuant to and in accordance with the Local Redevelopment Housing Law.

- 2. The redevelopment area determination shall authorize the Borough to use all powers provided by the Legislature for use in a redevelopment area other than the use of eminent domain (non-condemnation).
- 3. The Planning Board shall be permitted to retain the services of a professional planning firm with New Jersey licensed professionals to assist in conducting its investigation and issuing a report.
- 4. The Planning Board shall hold a public hearing on notice to the public pursuant to the Local Redevelopment Housing Law prior to conducting its public hearing and issuing its recommendation to the Borough Council.
- 5. All Borough officials and employees are hereby authorized and directed to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the terms of this Resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Mayor Harris asked for a motion to approve Resolution #18-265.

Council Member Collander made a motion to approve Resolution #18-265. Council Member Fife seconded the motion. A vote was taken with five Council Members in favor. Council Member Weber was opposed.

Mayor Harris proceeded with the Consent Agenda.

WHEREAS, the Borough realizes cost savings by purchasing services, equipment and materials through cooperative pricing systems; and
