Mayor Thaddeus J. Kobylarz called the virtual Regular Meeting of the Borough of Chatham to order on Monday, July 12, 2021 at 6:05 p.m. in the Council Chambers in Borough Hall, 54 Fairmount Avenue, Chatham, New Jersey.

SALUTE TO FLAG

Mayor Kobylarz asked for a moment of silence for those who have given their lives for our country. He also gave recognition to those protecting our lives during the current health pandemic caused by coronavirus, COVID-19. He acknowledged the 33.8 million Americans who contracted COVID-19, and the more than 606,000 people who have succumbed to the virus. Finally, he acknowledged the ten (10) Chatham Borough residents who have died since the pandemic.

Mayor Kobylarz proceeded to read the Mayor's Proclamation in honor of Reverend Mary Davis.

Mayor Kobylarz read the following Proclamation:

Mayor's Proclamation

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION HONORING REVEREND MARY DAVIS FOR HER EXEMPLARY SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY AND DECLARING WEDNESDAY, JULY 14, 2021 "REVEREND MARY DAVIS DAY" IN CHATHAM BOROUGH

WHEREAS, Chatham Borough is home to St. Paul's Episcopal Church, which serves the Episcopal community of the Chathams and surrounding communities; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Mary Davis has served St. Paul's Episcopal Church for the past ten years as its Rector; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Davis has proven to be a spiritual leader, counselor, friend, and confidant to her parishioners, as well as to many individuals outside the St. Paul's Episcopal Parish; moreover, she has shown herself to be a concerned and compassionate leader not just within her local church, but among and for the entire Chatham community; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Davis's service to the greater Chatham community has nowhere been demonstrated more compellingly than during the 2020-2021 Covid-19 Global Pandemic as a regular participant in the weekly "Mayor's Roundtable" meetings convened for the purpose of communicating vital information concerning the ongoing health crisis between Chatham Borough officials and the local clergy, as heads of their respective congregations and local church communities; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Davis's participation in these weekly discussions helped provide significant insight to Borough officials on the physical and emotional impact of this devastating virus within a key segment of the Borough's population, allowing them to make and adjust policy decisions based on an increasingly nuanced understanding of the local effects of the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, an invaluable outcome of these roundtable discussions was the effort early on to institute the "Chatham Food Drive", conducted weekly at the Chatham United Methodist Church, a project of which Reverend Davis was a significant contributor; and

WHEREAS, it is with great sadness that Bishop Carlyle Hughes accepted Rev. Davis's request for retirement effective July 11, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Davis is looking forward to exploring the lush mountains outside of Knoxville, Tennessee, her new home, and spending time cheering on the athletic exploits of her beloved University of Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Davis's hope upon her arrival in Chatham Borough ten years ago was to grow a community of faith, which she has undoubtedly achieved; and

WHEREAS, Chatham has been blessed by her dedicated service to this community for each and every day she has been here among us; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of Rev. Davis's commitment and service to the residents of Chatham Borough we wish her the very best in her retirement and all of the blessings that come with it.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that I, Thaddeus J. Kobylarz, Mayor of the Borough of Chatham, on behalf of myself and the Chatham Borough Council, do hereby express our profound gratitude to Rev. Davis, from the bottom of our hearts, for her exemplary commitment and tireless service to the greater Chatham community; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that I, Thaddeus J. Kobylarz, Mayor of the Borough of Chatham, on behalf of myself and the Chatham Borough Council, do hereby proclaim, as a way to honor Rev. Davis, that July 14, 2021, be forever known as "Reverend Mary Davis Day" in the Borough of Chatham.

RESOLUTION #21-255

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT AND CELEBRATION OF NATIONAL DISABILITY INDEPENDENCE DAY ON JULY 26, 2021 IN THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM

WHEREAS, July 26, 2021 commemorates 31 years since the signing of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA); and

WHEREAS, President George H.W. Bush signed the Americans with Disabilities Act into law on July 26, 1990, which became a landmark piece of the civil rights legislation; and

WHEREAS, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 prohibits discrimination against all individuals with disabilities in areas of public life such as employment, education, transportation, and accessibility to all public and private places that are open to the general public; and

WHEREAS, the intent of this historic piece of legislation is to grant the same rights and opportunities to people with disabilities as those enjoyed by everyone else; and

WHEREAS, the Americans with Disabilities Act has also mandated that building codes incorporate minimum standards of accessibility in both new and existing structures, and to remove barriers in existing buildings wherever feasible; and

WHEREAS, business owners should make reasonable modifications to accommodate those with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, research has shown that exclusion of people with disabilities can have a variety of psychological and sociological impacts often increasing the likelihood of prejudice, stereotyping, stigmatizing, and avoidance of such persons; and

WHEREAS, despite the progress made for those with disabilities, more remains to be done to ensure accessibility, accommodation, inclusion, and integration.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Chatham proudly joins in recognizing and celebrating the 31st anniversary of National Disability Independence Day on July 26, 2021; and further celebrates and supports the integration, inclusion, and accommodation of all individuals with disabilities in the Borough of Chatham, despite one's age, ethnicity, race, mental, emotional, and/or physical disability.

Mayor Kobylarz thanked Council Member Truilo for proposing the proclamation.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

MAYOR'S REPORT I:

Mayor Kobylarz delivered a portion of his Mayor's Report as follows:

Statistical Update on the Coronavirus:

Mayor Kobylarz reported that 547 residents of the Borough contracted COVID-19 since the start of the pandemic. Thus far, there are zero (0) reported cases for the month of July.

The State of New Jersey is trending in the wrong direction, with a current 7-day rolling average of 260 positive cases. This is an increase of 41% from three weeks ago. The statewide daily infection cases are a result of the new Delta variant, which is responsible for 41% of newly confirmed cases. The statewide transmission rate is now 0.95. 73% of New Jersey residents have been fully vaccinated. However, the number of new transmissions is mostly among the unvaccinated.

An expression of gratitude:

Mayor Kobylarz provided a statement of gratitude for the diversity celebration held on June 30, 2021, and the July 4, 2021, parade. He thanked the following departments for organizing both events: the Fire Department, Police Department, Department of Public Works, Emergency Squad, Borough Administrator Stephen Williams, and Community Services Director Janice Piccolo. Mayor Kobylarz further acknowledged Council President Dempsey, Council Member Treloar, June Quan (founder of the Chatham Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders with allies), Shirley Wu (founder of the Chatham Chinese Association) and Zandie Sutton, a resident who proposed the idea of conducting an event to celebrate diversity in the Borough.

National Night Out:

"National Night Out" hosted by the Chatham Borough Police Department will be held at Memorial Park on Tuesday, August 3, 2021, from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The community event will include free ice cream, giveaways, food trucks, live music, a dunk tank, tug of war, swimming, a basketball shootout, and frisbee toss, among other fun activities.

Mayor Kobylarz Absent:

Mayor Kobylarz announced his absence from July 15, 2021, through July 30, 2021, to assist the Boys Scouts as an Assistant Scoutmaster in New Mexico. During his absence, Council President Dempsey will serve as Acting Mayor for any event requiring the physical presence or input of the Mayor. During the absence of Council President Dempsey, Council Member Mathiasen will assume the role of Acting Mayor from July 23, 2021, to July 30, 2021.

Fran Drew - 32 Inwood Rd.

Mrs. Drew presented a plan for the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project. She advised that the proposed plan provides ample parking, retail stores, and a park-like area. She asked the Governing Body to consider the proposed plan. She further voiced her opposition to the current redevelopment plan.

Jack Drew - 32 Inwood Rd.

Mr. Drew requested the Governing Body to review and discuss the plan presented by Mrs. Drew.

Michael Dean - 181 N. Passaic Avenue

Mr. Dean inquired about Resolution # 21-264 and requested additional information concerning the Borough's interest in hiring a Special Redevelopment Planner. He further inquired about the developer's cost, and the number of proposed residential and commercial units. He stated that residents of the Borough have voiced their disapproval of the redevelopment project and hopes the Governing Body will take their concerns into consideration.

Brigid McMenamin - 133 Center Avenue

Ms. McMenamin stated the Mayor's action is inconsistent with his promise to consider the public's input prior to making a final decision on the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project.

Mayor Kobylarz stated that a decision has not been made and will not be made until a full comprehensive vetting of the public's input is executed.

Joyce Martinsen - 64 Hillside Avenue

Ms. Martinsen voiced her opposition to the redevelopment project and asked the Mayor to consider a new redevelopment idea, such as the one proposed by Mrs. Drew.

Robert Penn - 165 N. Passaic Avenue

Mr. Penn thanked the Governing Body for how they handled the COVID-19 pandemic in the Borough. He voiced his opposition to the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Plan and asked the Governing Body to consider the idea presented by Mrs. Drew. He further asked the Governing Body to consider the traffic impact a redevelopment project would have on the Borough. He proposed a memorial for residents who have supported the community in its place.

Mayor Kobylarz stated that throughout the pandemic, the Governing Body tried to ensure residents were protected by making informed decisions and obtaining professional guidance. He thanked Mr. Penn for his acknowledgement. He also informed Mr. Penn that the Governing Body will continue to listen to the public's concerns and take them into consideration prior to making a final decision. The Governing Body may further explore different options for a redevelopment project.

Council Member Truilo stated that the Governing Body is committed to exploring all possibilities for the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project and will make the best decision for the community and its residents.

Mayor Kobylarz proposed changing the current name of the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project.

Joyce Martinsen - 64 Hillside Avenue

Ms. Martinsen voiced her opposition to changing the name of the redevelopment project from Post Office Plaza.

Brigid McMenamin - 133 Center Avenue

Ms. McMenamin stated her disapproval of the Mayor's statement on changing the name of the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project.

Michael Dean - 181 N. Passaic Avenue

Mr. Dean also voiced his opposition to the name change of the redevelopment project.

Stuart Carr - 3 Crestwood Drive, Chatham Township

Mr. Carr stated his disapproval of the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project and requested the Governing Body to consider the plan proposed earlier by Mrs. Dew. He questioned what would happen to the 3 ¹/₂ acres of private land if Post Office Plaza remained the same. Finally, he thanked the Mayor for keeping residents informed about the redevelopment plan prior to making a final decision.

Tricia Finley - 35 Woodland Road

Ms. Finley spoke against the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project. She also inquired whether the newly proposed concept implies that the Governing Body intends to sell its land to the redeveloper. She asked the Governing Body to consider not selling its land, as ownership of the land gives the Borough control over the building.

Mayor Kobylarz stated that the land at Post Office Plaza is an ongoing matter of discussion.

Freddie Bicknese - 137 N. Hillside Ave.

Mr. Bicknese voiced his opinion that the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project should be built small or not at all.

Seeing no one else wishing to be heard, Mayor Kobylarz closed the meeting to the public.

Mayor Kobylarz proceeded to Council Member Reports.

REPORTS

COUNCIL MEMBERS

Council President Dempsey – Council President Dempsey reported that Community Services and the Department of Public Works met and discussed outdoor activities that will be available during the summer and reminded the community of the current ongoing events in the Borough of Chatham.

The Farmers' Market is held every Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Spring Serenades continue on Thursdays at 6:30 p.m. with an opening act and a main-stage act. The Garden Club and the Department of Community Services are changing the downtown planters to maintain the beautification of the downtown area. The Municipal Pool is now open. It will also be open for "National Night Out" scheduled for Tuesday, August 3, 2021. The Fishawack Festival will be held in September. Additional information

will be available in the near future. Finally, Council President Dempsey thanked the Department of Public Works for their hard work and advised that the tennis courts and basketball courts at Garden Park have been completed and are ready for the enjoyment and use of the public.

Council President Dempsey thanked Council Member Treloar and the founder of the Chatham Chinese Association, Shirley Wu, for their work and effort on the diversity celebration event.

Council Member Mathiasen – Council Member Mathiasen reported that the Communication and Technology Advisory Committee had not met but acknowledged the hard work of Melanie Politi on the website and social media. She advised that Council Member Resto, the Board of Health, and the Environmental Commission met to discuss gasoline powered leaf blowers and their health effects. The group will be working on an educational campaign about the benefits of switching to electric leaf blowers.

Council Member Koronkiewicz – Council Member Koronkiewicz had nothing new to report.

Council Member Treloar – Council Member Treloar had nothing new to report.

Council Member Resto – Council Member Resto reported on the press release requesting donations to the food pantry. He thanked residents for their generous donations.

Council Member Truilo – Council Member Truilo had nothing new to report.

MAYOR 'S REPORT II

Mayor Kobylarz had nothing further to report.

Borough Administrator Stephen Williams reported the following:

PSE&G will begin milling Chatham Street on Tuesday, July 13, 2021 followed by paving.

WHEREAS, the pandemic caused by coronavirus, COVID-19 inflicted economical strain on many businesses globally, including businesses in the Borough of Chatham; and

RESOLUTION #21-259

RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE PAYMENT OF THE THIRD QUARTER PROPERTY TAX BILLS FROM AUGUST 1, 2021 TO SEPTEMBER 3, 2021

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 54:4-64 requires municipal property tax bills to be mailed at least 47 days prior to August 1st of each year; and

WHEREAS, the state Division of Local Government Services is experiencing a backlog in reviewing and approving municipal budgets, causing a delay in the certification of the Borough's tax rate by the Morris County Board of Taxation and the delay in the mailing of the 2021 tax bills by the Chatham Borough Tax Collector;

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 54:4-64 further mandates that property taxpayers shall be given adequate notice of the date when taxes are due before interest is charged on delinquent tax payments; and

WHEREAS, by law, taxpayers have 25 days from the date of mailing of the tax bill to pay property taxes due without interest or penalty; and

WHEREAS, the taxpayer would have less than the required 25-day period from the date of mailing the tax bill to the third quarter August 1, 2021 due date to pay property taxes without interest or penalty; and

WHEREAS, the Tax Collector has recommended that payments for the third quarter property taxes should be extended from August 1, 2021 to September 3, 2021.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Chatham that they hereby concur with the Tax Collector's recommendation and authorize to extend the payment of the third quarter property taxes from August 1, 2021 to September 3, 2021; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the payment of property taxes shall be considered delinquent after September 3, 2021, after which date interest will be charged from August 1, 2021 to the date of payment.

RESOLUTION #21-260

RESOLUTION TO RETURN CASH PERFORMANCE BOND TO DEVINNE BRAVOCO FOR CONSTRUCTION CONDUCTED AT 71 N. SUMMIT AVENUE

WHEREAS, Devinne Bravoco submitted to the Borough of Chatham a Cash Performance Bond in the amount of \$1,500.00 for construction work conducted at 71 N. Summit Avenue, pursuant to the requirements of the Borough Engineer; and

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE BOROUGH ADMINISTRATOR TO SIGN A LETTER OF INTENT WITH THE NEW JERSEY TRANSIT CORPORATION FOR THE CONTINUED LEASE OF A PARCEL OF LAND IN CHATHAM BOROUGH

WHEREAS, New Jersey Transit Corporation (NJ Transit) owns a rectangular parcel of land in the Borough of Chatham (the "Borough") that is approximately 7,525 square feet along the Morristown Line, M.P. 23.00, adjacent to 102 Summit Avenue, which the Borough uses as a recycling center (the "Licensed Area"); and

WHEREAS, the Borough engaged in a Lease Agreement [# L1427-2300-08] with NJ Transit for the use of land in accordance with the terms and conditions of the license agreement, adopted by Resolution #17-177 on May 8, 2017; and

WHEREAS, the current lease agreement will expire on June 30, 2022, and action is required by the Borough to affirm its intent to continue the use of the land under a new License Agreement with NJ Transit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Chatham that Borough Administrator Stephen Williams is hereby authorized to execute a letter affirming the Borough's intent to continue the lease of the aforementioned land upon the expiration of the current agreement.

RESOLUTION #21-262

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM TO ENTER INTO A COOPERATIVE PRICING AGREEMENT WITH HUNTERDON COUNTY EDUCATIONAL SERVICES COMMISSION

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-11(5) authorizes contracting units to establish a Cooperative Pricing System and to enter into Cooperative Pricing Agreements for its administration; and

WHEREAS, the Hunterdon County Educational Services Commission, hereinafter referred to as the "Lead Agency" has offered voluntary participation in a Cooperative Pricing System for the purchase of goods and sevices; and

WHEREAS, on July 12, 2021 the Governing Body of the Borough of Chatham, County of Morris, State of New Jersey duly considered participation in a Cooperative Pricing System for the provision and performance of goods and services.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Chatham that the Borough is authorized to enter into a Cooperative Pricing Agreement with the Lead Agency, and the Lead Agency shall be responsible for complying with the provisions of the Local Public

Contracts Law (*N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq.*) and all other provisions of the revised statutes of the State of New Jersey.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to execute the Cooperative Pricing Agreement with the Lead Agency.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all Borough officials and employees are hereby authorized and directed to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the terms of this Resolution.
