DESIGNATING THE WEEK OF MAY 16 – MAY 22, 2021 AS NATIONAL EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS) WEEK

WHEREAS, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) are a vital public service, providing lifesaving care to those in need 24 hours a day, seven days a week; and

WHEREAS, the EMS system consists of emergency physicians, emergency nurses, emergency medical technicians, paramedics, firefighters, educators, administrators, and others; and

WHEREAS, EMS are now firmly established as a key component of the medical care continuum and EMS practitioners serve a vital role in saving lives from sudden cardiac arrest and trauma; in getting people to hospitals best equipped to treat heart attacks and strokes; and in showing care and compassion to their patients in their most difficult moments; and

WHEREAS, access to quality emergency care dramatically improves the survival and recovery rate of those who experience sudden illness or injury; and

WHEREAS, the all-volunteer Chatham Emergency Squad has primary responsibility for responding to medical emergencies in the Chatham and provides CPR training and First Aid training to residents of the Chatham to improve preparedness for medical emergencies; and

WHEREAS, our community is fortunate to be served by such dedicated volunteers who give their time in service of the Chatham Emergency Squad and engage in hundreds of hours of specialized training to enhance lifesaving knowledge and skills; and

WHEREAS, National Emergency Medical Services Week brings together local communities and medical personnel to publicize safety and honor the dedication of those who provide the day-to-day lifesaving services of medicine's "front line."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Chatham that they do hereby proclaim the week of May 16 – May 22, 2021, as Emergency Medical Services Week in the Borough of Chatham and give a heartfelt thanks to the dedicated volunteers of the Chatham Emergency Squad; and

RESOLUTION #21-188

RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING MAY 2021 AS MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, mental health is essential to everyone's overall health and well-being; and

WHEREAS, behavioral health disorders, including major depression, bi-polar disorder, schizophrenia, panic disorders, post-traumatic stress disorder and obsessive-compulsive disorders affect many children and youth every year, regardless of age, gender, race, ethnicity, religion or economic status; and

WHEREAS, a focus on prevention and early intervention efforts could greatly reduce the number of children and adults experiencing serious mental health conditions; and

WHEREAS, children, and adults can recover from mental illness and lead full, productive lives in the community; and

WHEREAS, since 1949, May has officially been recognized as Mental Health Month; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Chatham, as a Stigma Free community, aims to eradicate the stigma associated with mental illness and substance use disorders and is dedicated to raising awareness of these illnesses by creating an environment where affected individuals are supported in their efforts to achieve wellness and recovery; and

WHEREAS, each elected official, business, government agency, health-care provider, organization and citizen share the burden of mental health issues and has a responsibility to promote mental wellness and support prevention efforts.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Chatham, hereby declare May 2021 as Mental Health Month and thereby request that each resident, citizen and business recommit our community to increasing awareness and understanding of mental health, the steps our children, youth and adults can take to protect their mental health, and the need for appropriate and accessible services for all people, especially children and youth with mental health conditions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Chatham implore our legislature to mandate insurance carriers to afford the same breath of insurance coverage to mental illness as they do for physical illnesses.

RESOLUTION #21-189

PARENTS WHO HOST, LOSE THE MOST: DON'T BE A PARTY TO TEENAGE DRINKING CAMPAIGN

WHEREAS, alcohol use by young people is dangerous, not only because of the risks associated with acute impairment, but also because of the threat to their long-term development and well-being; and

WHEREAS, adults who provide alcohol to those below the legal drinking age of 21 are placing those youth at risk for health, safety and legal problems; and

WHEREAS, it is illegal to give or allow your teen's friends to drink alcohol in your home, even with their parents' permission, and anyone found guilty of providing alcohol to any underage youth can face up to a \$1,000 fine and six months in prison, in addition to any civil action that can be brought about as a result of damage(s) or injury related to the offense; and

WHEREAS, adults have the authority and responsibility to provide our youth with alternative opportunities by creating alcohol-free activities; and

WHEREAS, the Drug-Free Action Alliance, through the "Parents Who Host, Lose The Most: Don't be a Party to Teenage Drinking" campaign provides the educational materials to raise community awareness regarding this illegal and unhealthy practice.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Chatham that they hereby proclaim the month of June 2021 to be the Parents Who Host, Lose The Most: Don't be a Party to Teenage Drinking in the Borough of Chatham; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Borough officials not only discourage the use of alcohol by those below the legal age of consumption, but also urge all Borough citizens to refuse to provide alcoholic beverages to underage youth and to continue to take the necessary steps to discourage this illegal and unhealthy activity.

RESOLUTION #21-190

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT FOR ASIAN AMERICAN AND PACIFIC ISLANDER HERITAGE MONTH

WHEREAS, Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Heritage Month originated in 1978 when New York Congressman Frank Horton introduced a bill that called for the first week each May to be so designated with President Jimmy Carter issuing the first presidential proclamation for Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week in March 1979. AAPI Heritage Week was expanded to a commemorative month in 1990 in a bill signed into law by President George H.W. Bush, which had to be reauthorized each year the commemoration received permanent designation each May, in a law enacted in 1992; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Horton was inspired by former Capitol Hill staffer Jeanie Jew, who approached him about the idea in 1976. Jeannie Jew observed that just as Black History Month was decreed by President Ford in 1976, and Hispanic Heritage Week was decreed by President Johnson in 1968, there was a need to provide similar recognition to Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders; and

WHEREAS, Jeanie Jew's great-grandfather, M.Y. Lee, had immigrated to the United States from China in the 1800's and had helped build the Transcontinental Railroad. As noted by Congressman Horton, M.Y. Lee became a prominent California businessman who was later killed in Oregon during a period of anti-Chinese and anti-Asian sentiment in that state; and

WHEREAS, the month of May was selected for two reasons: (1) to commemorate the arrival of the first known Japanese immigrant to the U.S. on May 7, 1843, and (2) to honor the completion of the Transcontinental Railroad on May 19, 1869, which upwards of 20,000 Chinese workers helped to construct; and

WHEREAS, as an insidious consequence of the COVID-19 pandemic, the AAPI community in the United States is experiencing an alarming rise in anti-AAPI hate crimes and bias incidents, largely being unfairly blamed for the Coronavirus pandemic and echoing the anti-Asian sentiments that were prevalent in the 1800s and that led to the enactment of the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882, which prohibited Chinese immigration to the United States, and which was not repealed until 1943; and

WHEREAS, in our continued efforts to live up to the American values of freedom, justice and equality for all people, the events of this past year have made evident two principles: first, that institutional and structural racism continues to have insidious consequences on the peace, health and safety of our larger community and nation, and must be dismantled; and second, that it is incumbent upon each of us as individuals to challenge our own biases or assumptions regarding race and become better educated.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Borough Council of the Borough of Chatham proudly joins in recognizing the annual celebration of Asian American and Pacific Islander History Month and continuing our collective journey, as a community and nation, in honoring and deepening our knowledge of the history and contributions of AAPI members to the American economy, society, culture, freedoms, and values.

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Council Member Treloar motioned to approve Resolution #21-190, seconded by Council Member Resto. By a unanimous voice vote, Resolution # 21-190 was approved.

Mayor Kobylarz provided a commemorative copy of Resolution # 21-190 to Council Member Irene Treloar, Co-Founder/Board member of the Chinese Association, Shirley Wu and Founder of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders with Allies and Chatham and Neighbors Jun Quon.

Council Member Treloar, Mrs. Wu and Mrs. Quon each gave a brief speech and thanked the Mayor and Council.

RESOLUTION PROCLAIMING MAY 2021 AS BRAIN TUMOR AWARENESS MONTH IN CHATHAM BOROUGH

WHEREAS, an estimated 700,000 people in the United States are living with a primary brain tumor, and approximately 85,000 more will be diagnosed in 2021; and

WHEREAS, brain tumors can be deadly, significantly impact quality of life, and change everything for a patient and their loved ones; and

WHEREAS, brain tumors do not discriminate, inflicting men, women, and children of all races and ethnicities; and

WHEREAS, brain tumors are the most common solid tumor in children ages 0-14; and

WHEREAS, hundreds of non-profit organizations at the local and national level including the American Childhood Cancer Organization and WITH Grace Initiative, are helping children with cancer and their families cope through educational, emotional and financial support; and

WHEREAS, researchers and healthcare professionals work diligently dedicating their expertise to treat and cure brain tumors; and

WHEREAS, too many are affected by this deadly disease and more must be done to raise awareness and find a cure.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Borough Council of the Borough of Chatham proudly proclaim May 2021 Brain Tumor Awareness Month in the Borough of Chatham.

Council Member Resto motioned to approve Resolution #21-193, seconded by Council Member Treloar. By a unanimous voice vote, Resolution #21-193 was approved.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Chief Brian Gibbons - Motor Vehicle Burglaries and Thefts.

Chief Gibbons gave a presentation on motor vehicle burglaries and thefts within the Borough of Chatham. Chief Gibbons stated that vehicles that have been burglarized were unlocked and vehicles that were stolen had keys inside. During his PowerPoint presentation he explained that the Borough had 50 incidents of automobile burglaries/thefts in 2020. Four (4) burglary attempts occurred in 2020 but were unsuccessful because vehicle doors were locked. As of today, one (1) vehicle theft has occurred, five (5) have been burglarized and three (3) attempted burglaries were reported. He urged Chatham residents to lock their cars and remove the key fobs when the vehicle is not in use.

The Borough of Chatham Police Department also received approval from the Council to purchase two license plate readers to be deployed later this year. This apparatus will assist in identifying stolen motor vehicles that enter/leave the Borough. This coordinated effort allows video footage to be taken as criminal evidence and help provide descriptions of suspects.

Chief Gibbons informed residents that Chatham Borough Police Officers will be prohibited from pursuing stolen vehicles in the Borough due to risk to residents. However, the department will pursue a vehicle if it is used in a crime.

MAYOR'S REPORT I:

Mayor Kobylarz delivered a portion of his report as follows:

Statistical Update on the Coronavirus:

Mayor Kobylarz reported an increase in positive coronavirus cases of 541 in Chatham Borough. Last week the Borough saw sixteen (16) new cases. New Jersey is trending in a gradual downslope, with the current 7-day rolling average of 1,080 positive cases. Two weeks ago, it was 2,279. The transmission rate is now 0.94.

Mayor Kobylarz stated that data reflects 85% of the adult population in the Borough have been vaccinated with their first dose of the vaccine and 59% are fully vaccinated. He cautioned the public to remain vigilant; and to mitigate the spread of the virus by adhering to protective measures of washing hands, maintaining social distance, wearing masks, cooperating with contact tracers, and getting vaccinated.

NJ Transit VAXRide Program:

New Jersey Transit is offering free round-trip tickets to and from vaccination sites within New Jersey. This applies to New Jersey Transit buses, rail, Access Link customers, and Light Rail transportation networks. Tickets can be obtained through the New Jersey Transit mobile application or by calling the customer service hotline at 973-275-5555.

Suicide Prevention Zoom Webinar:

On Thursday, May 13, 2021, at 7:00 p.m. the New Jersey Chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention will host a zoom webinar entitled, "Talk Saves Lives". This webinar is an introduction to Suicide Prevention. It will cover the general scope of suicide prevention and what people can do to combat suicide. Participants will learn common risk factors, warning signs associated with suicide, and how to keep themselves and others safe. Small Business Federal and State Grants and Loans Webinar:

Edward Lefty Grimes- East Hanover Road:

Mr. Grimes asked the Mayor and Council to consider permitting cannabis to be sold in the Borough of Chatham for medical use. Medical cannabis helps those critically ill, when used accordingly.

Hugh Giordano- 57 Argyle CT, Summit:

Mr. Giordano asked the Mayor and Council to consider individuals that apply for a dispensary or a cultivation license within the medical realm of Chatham Borough and informed the Governing Body that cannabis dispensaries offer good union jobs with great benefits and retirement plans in New Jersey.

Jeffrey King- 24 Elizabeth Parkway Eatontown:

Mr. King asked the Mayor and Council to consider an ordinance that would allow medical cannabis in the Borough. He stated that many veterans of the Borough can benefit from medical cannabis accessible near their homes.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM IN THE COUNTY OF MORRIS, STATE OF NEW JERSEY AMENDING CHAPTER 195 OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM, "PARKS, PLAYGROUNDS AND RECREATION AREAS," TO CLARIFY THAT SMOKING OF ANY SUBSTANCE IN SUCH AREAS IS PROHIBITED

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Which Ordinance was introduced and passed on first reading at a regular Council meeting held on April 26, 2021.

REPORTS

COUNCIL MEMBERS

Council President Dempsey- Council President Dempsey acknowledged and thanked Mary Kay Lord who matched dollar-for-dollar contributions received from residents for the Chatham Community Food Distribution. She further thanked the Governing Body and Sunnywood’s Florist for contributing flowers that were given to all mothers who visited the distribution line on Wednesday, May 5, 2021. T.M. Ward was also acknowledged for their donation of coffee and packages of candy for Mother's Day.

The Chatham Community Concert Series this summer will begin on July 22, 2021, with the first outdoor concert at the gazebo followed by a concert every other week on Thursdays through August. The last concert will be held on September 2, 2021. The Borough will also be hosting Spring Serenades on Thursdays, starting May 20, 2021, and it will run through June 2021 at Reasoner Park for residents dining at the gazebo. Janice Piccolo and Maggie Grady were acknowledged for their hard work in coordinating these events.
